About the Program

About the Artist

Gavin Black is Director of the Princeton Early Keyboard Center in Princeton, New Jersey, where he teaches harpsichord, clavichord, organ, continuo playing and related matters. www.pekc.org He has been an active recitalist on Baroque keyboard instruments for forty years, mostly in the northeastern United States, specializing in seventeenth-century keyboard repertoire, with a particular emphasis on Frescobaldi and Sweelinck, and in the music of Bach. Gavin has recorded for Musical Heritage Society, PGM Recordings, and Centaur Records. He has been closely involved with *The Art of the Fugue* since the early 1970s, initially as a listener, and since 1985 as a performer of the work on organ and on harpsichord. He has recorded the work in a version for two harpsichords with jazz pianist, record producer, and harpsichordist George Hazelrigg – about which more information can be found at www.theartofthefugue.com – and is in the midst of a long-term project to record separate versions on organ, harpsichord, and clavichord. Gavin has also specialized in the music of the late former New York icon Moondog with whom he worked directly on performances of his music on harpsichord and organ. Gavin has performed in the Midtown Concerts series many times over the years, both as a soloist and as a chamber musician, beginning in the early days when the concerts were held at St. Francis of Assisi on 31st Street.
