## About the Program

In 1605, famed English architect Inigo Jones brought the newly developed theorbo from Italy into England. At Dover, customs impounded the instrument, fearing it was some engine from the popish lands brought to destroy the king. The group emphasizes fun, lascivious, nerdy and dramatic programs, and features rarely heard ensembles for lutes, theorbos and guitars. For today's program exploring the repertoire and world of the English Guittar, we have joined forces with Duo Marchard: Andrew Rutherford and Marcia Young, who have been exploring this and other repertoires together since 1995.

## **About the Artists**

English Guittar and Archlutenist **Daniel Swenberg** plays a wide variety of lutes and guitars: Baroque, Renaissance, Classical, Romantic, small, medium and large. Chief amongst these is the theorbo – the long lute that you are either wondering about or overheard your neighbor discuss. Daniel Swenberg plays with myriad groups, mostly in the EZ-Pass territories, California and Toronto. He is on the faculty of The Juilliard School's Historical Performance program. Daniel Swenberg's programs range from Weiss to Vice – an obsession with Mandeville and 18th-century economics.


English Guittarist Andrew Rutherford has been playing the lute and related instruments since the mid-1970's. He's a founding member of My Lord Chamberlain's Consort, a New York-based group that specializes in English Lute Songs, and he is half of Duo Marchard, with soprano/harpist Marcia Young. He plays theorbo for Albany, New York's Empire Baroque. Also an instrument maker, Andrew has built lutes for many noted players, and is a regular faculty member at the Lute Society of America's Summer seminars. A recent obsession is the English guittar. He has restored several of them to playing condition and has been part of the modern revival of the instrument.

**Leah Nelson**, Leah Nelson, violin, specializes in music from the 17th, 18th, and early 19th centuries. She has led ensembles for Chicago's Music of the Baroque, Gotham Chamber Opera, Aspen Festival Opera Theater, Chicago Opera Theater, and is Artist in Residence at the Church of St. Luke in the Fields in Greenwich Village. Leah teaches historical performance practice at Rutgers University and maintains a private studio. Pandemic season 2020 was spent Zoom-ing with colleagues thru 18th-century treatises on European music making. In 2011, her *Biber: The Sacred Mysteries* was released to critical acclaim, with Oxford University Press' journal, Early Music, hailing it "an elegant and beautiful recording."

Marcia Young, a founding member of My Lord Chamberlain's Consort and the medieval trio Trefoil, also performs frequently with lutenists Andrew Rutherford and Chris Morrongiello. She has appeared with Parthenia and Piffaro, the Folger, Bacheler, and Newberry Consorts, at the San Francisco, Amherst, Madison and Washington Early Music Festivals, the Ars Antiqua series in Chappaqua, the Distinguished Artists Series in Syosset, the Ridotto series in Huntington, the HotShops Gallery space in Omaha and the Century Association in New York. She serves as Director of Performance Studies for the Stern College Department of Music.
